

PUBLIC HEARINGS

LOUDON CITY COUNCIL

November 21, 2011

Public hearings were held before the Loudon City Council on November 21, 2011 in the Council Meeting Room. Those present for all of the public hearings were Mayor Judy Keller, Council members Judy Jones and Jimmy Parks. Councilmember Mike Cartwright was present for the second and third hearings. Councilmember Lynn Millsaps was absent. Also present were City Manager Lynn Mills and City Recorder Stephanie Putkonen. The press was represented at the third hearing by Vicky Newman with the *News Herald*. One person was present for the first public hearing, five people were present for the second and nine were present for the third public hearing.

ABANDONING THE UNOPENED ALLEYWAY EAST OF WALNUT STREET AND PARALLEL TO CHURCH STREET AND CEDAR STREET

Mayor Keller called the public hearing to order at 7:15 P.M. She called for comments or questions regarding the ordinance.

Manager Mills explained that the owner of the property at 20 Walnut Street had received a HOME grant to rebuild her house. The closing of this alley would allow the house to be a little larger.

There being no further questions or comments, Mayor Keller closed the public hearing at 7:16 P.M.

ESTABLISHING A DEBT MANAGEMENT POLICY

Mayor Keller called the public hearing to order at 7:20 P.M. She called for comments or questions regarding the ordinance.

Manager Mills explained that this version of the ordinance has incorporated changes recommended by the comptroller's office. After passage at this meeting, it would need to be voted on again next month.

ACCEPTING AS A PUBLIC STREET A CERTAIN 100' RIGHT OF WAY GRANTED TO THE CITY OF LOUDON IN BLAIR BEND INDUSTRIAL PARK OFF OF BLAIR BEND DRIVE AND NAMING SAID STREET BLAIR LANE

Mayor Keller called the public hearing to order at 7:25 P.M. She called for comments or questions.

Manager Mills explained that in the 1980's when Blair Bend Industrial Park was expanded for the location of A.E. Staley, it was agreed that public access would be provided to property that would otherwise be land locked. The street was actually built, but had grown up over time because it was not used. It was cleaned up and ready to be formally accepted and named.
